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RECRUITING INCENTIVES

Education: The Service Cancellable Loan is a student financial aid program that provides loans to be used towards the cost of tuition in an undergraduate or graduate program at an eligible postsecondary institution while serving in good standing with the Ga. NG. Additional recruiting incentives include the Post-9/11 GI Bill, Tuition Assistance, and Student Loan Repayment Program.

Bonuses: Up to \$20,000 enlistment bonuses for qualified applicants in select critical skill and low density military occupational specialties.

Health Insurance: Tricare Reserve Select and Tricare Dental are premium-based health insurance and dental programs available to Georgia National Guard members and their families.

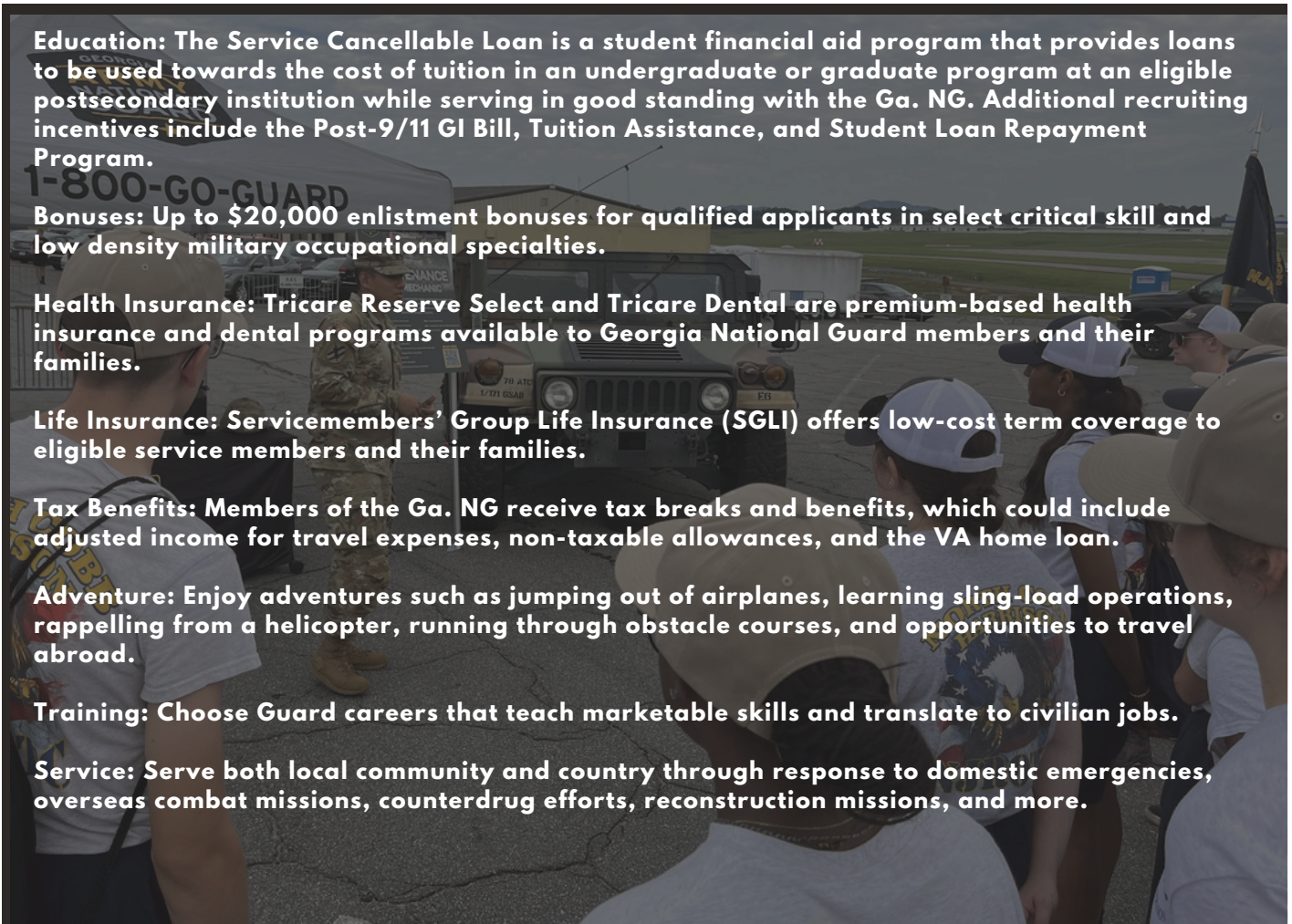
Life Insurance: Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance (SGLI) offers low-cost term coverage to eligible service members and their families.

Tax Benefits: Members of the Ga. NG receive tax breaks and benefits, which could include adjusted income for travel expenses, non-taxable allowances, and the VA home loan.

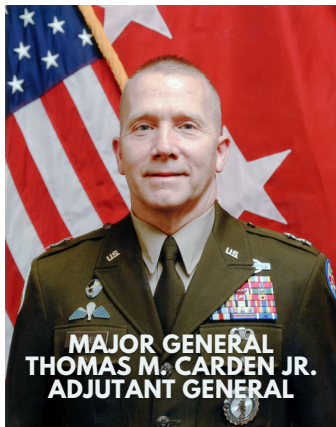

We also celebrated the completion of our next generation hangar at the Air Dominance Center in Savannah. Clearly, the Georgia Department of Defense is preparing for tomorrow's requirements today!

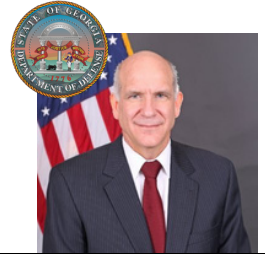

The Georgia Army National Guard, consisting of over 11,000 of our nation's finest Soldiers continues to excel in meeting both state and national level requirements. Throughout 2023, the Georgia Army National Guard was globally engaged, supporting our Allies and Partners during combat, deterrence, and training operations overseas, increasing security along the nation's Southwest border, and successfully supporting Domestic Response operations here at home. During the next decade, our Army will undergo its largest modernization effort in over forty years. As we transition to Multi-Domain Operations (MDO) and the Army of 2030 and beyond, our priorities, however, will not change. We will remain focused on taking care of our Soldiers, Civilian Employees, and our Families, while also ensuring our formations remain ready and relevant for both the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

WINS

- Awarded funding for a new Readiness Center located at Fort Eisenhower, Georgia, and currently in the process of renovating 20 of 24 planned armories across the State.
- We are continuously nominated for future force structure growth (Extended Range Cannon Artillery Battalion, an Intelligence/Electronic Warfare Company, and potentially a Mobile Protected Firepower Battalion as our most recent examples).
- Received the Army National Guard Director's Award in Excellence for Integrated Management Systems (IMS) for the third year in a row.

CHALLENGES

- While we continue to successfully meet our overall end-strength goals, we are experiencing an unprecedented national level recruiting crisis.
- Continued fielding of new equipment and weapons platforms concurrently with the active Army component in an effort to remain relevant, interoperable, and a lethal Total Force.
- Our infrastructure and facilities will continue to require modernization as we transition the Force to Multi-Domain Operations (MDO) and the Army of 2030.

The nearly 3,000 Airmen of the Georgia Air National Guard remain the cornerstone to providing support to local, state, and federal authorities for domestic response to natural disasters and to defend our nation. From the mobility mission of the 165th Airlift Wing, the command and control expertise of the 116th Air Control Wing, the training mission of the Savannah Combat Readiness Center (CRTC), as well as six other geographically separated units (GSUs), the Georgia Air National Guard is at the forefront of Air Force capabilities. The missions of our units complement the Army, Air Force, Marine, Navy, Space Force, NATO, and coalition partners. The Georgia Air National Guard creates a unique, joint, all-domain command and control environment for tomorrow's fight during this challenging time.

- The Savannah CRTC hosted Air Combat Command's William Tell Fighter Competition
- The Savannah CRTC hosted NGB's first XAB Lead Wing training exercise
- The 165th Airlift Wing prepares to receive the Air National Guard's only 8.1 Block C130Js in January 2024

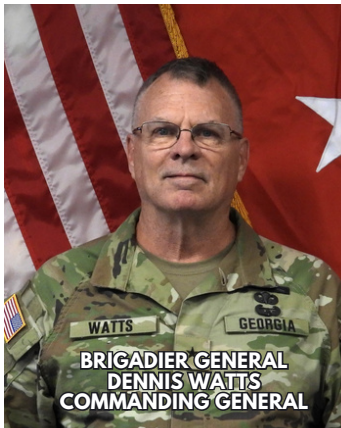

The Ga. SDF is a component of the Ga. DoD, along with the Ga. ANG and Ga. ARNG. The Ga. SDF is an organized, disciplined, and professionally trained volunteer force. These Soldiers, many with prior military service, provide rapid response in assisting Georgia communities during emergencies. The Ga. SDF also contributes military support to units of the United States and the Ga. DoD. Other missions engage the Ga. SDF's search and rescue expertise and disaster response experience. The organization serves under the direction of the Governor and the Adjutant General. Fast and first with boots on the ground, the Ga. SDF stands "Ready to Serve!"

WINS

- Completed 114 missions, totaling 1,206 man-days, in addition to conducting monthly drills and annual training
- Conducted military entrance processing and initial entry training courses
- Provided professional military education and offered specialty training, including CPR/first aid, chainsaw and debris clearing, search and rescue, and support to civilian agencies
- Provided operational support to the Ga. ARNG, including opposing force engagement



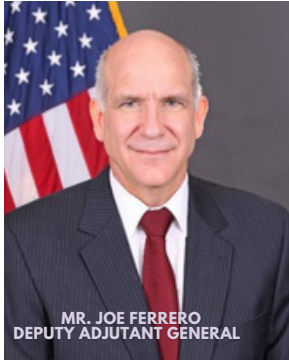

State Operations



The Georgia Department of Defense State Operations continues to provide exceptional support to the Army and Air National Guards as well as its Youth Education programs. This function is led by our Deputy Adjutant General, Mr. Joe Ferrero, who oversees our Financial Management Division and State Personnel Office.

While this past year has been hard on recruitment and retention, state operations has been able to maintain their support to all programs by having a dedicated workforce that has stepped up to minimize the challenges faced during this period.

WINS

- Executed over \$12M in state general funds, \$17.6M in other state funds and \$89.6M in Federal Funds.
- Administrative support of State Operational Asset Readiness construction program. \$13.3M executed in support of SOAR.
- State Active-Duty administrative support via EMAC to state of Florida.

CHALLENGES

- Recruitment and retention of human capital.
- Increased technical expertise requirements.
- Balancing fiscal law requirements with operational demands.

Infrastructure Projects

The Georgia National Guard Construction and Facilities Management Office (CFMO) focuses efforts on state and federal facilities – both maintenance, repair and new construction. CFMO maintains a net worth 1.85 Billion in facilities, with one billion dollars federal and \$850 million for state properties.

STATE OPERATIONAL ASSET READINESS (SOAR)

SOAR is Georgia's program to renovate/repair aging armories.

Year 1 (FY21): Construction in Covington, Springfield, Winder, Calhoun, Milledgeville, and Rome. Completed FY23 at \$24 million

Year 2 (FY22): Construction in Tifton, Thomasville, Glennville, Canton, Elberton, and Hinesville. Completed FY23 at \$24 million

Year 3 (FY23): Construction in Jackson, Toccoa, Newnan, Griffin, Valdosta, and Dublin. Construction in FY 23 and FY24 at \$24 million

Year 4 (FY24): Construction projected for South Cobb, Brunswick, and Columbus using mostly state dollars due to reduction in federal funding match at approximately \$13-15 million. Construction beginning late FY24.



The South Cobb Armory, located in Marietta, was an abandoned Department of Public Works building in the 1990s. The building is fully abated and under construction, estimated completion in FY24. The site will serve as a recruiting center.



Youth Programs

Youth Challenge Academy (YCA)

The Georgia YCAs include the Fort Eisenhower Youth Challenge Academy and the Fort Stewart Youth Challenge Academy. The YCAs support the academic and personal development of 16-18-year-old Georgia teens who are at risk of not completing high school. The YCAs provide a 22-week, military-like residential experience for the cadet's personal growth and education (HS diploma or GED) so they can achieve their goals after graduation.

Job Challenge Academy (JCA)

The Georgia YCAs include the Fort Eisenhower Youth Challenge Academy and the Fort Stewart Youth Challenge Academy. The YCAs support the academic and personal development of 16-18-year-old Georgia teens who are at risk of not completing high school. The YCAs provide a 22-week, military-like residential experience for the cadet's personal growth and education (HS diploma or GED) so they can achieve their goals after graduation.

STARBASE

Peach State STARBASE is a premier educational program, federally funded, administered by the Department of Defense, and sponsored by the Georgia National Guard. At STARBASE, students participate in challenging activities in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM). They have the opportunity to interact with military personnel inside and outside of the classroom, exploring careers and observing STEM applications in the "real world." The program is housed at the Clay National Guard Center in Marietta, Georgia.

State Partnership Program

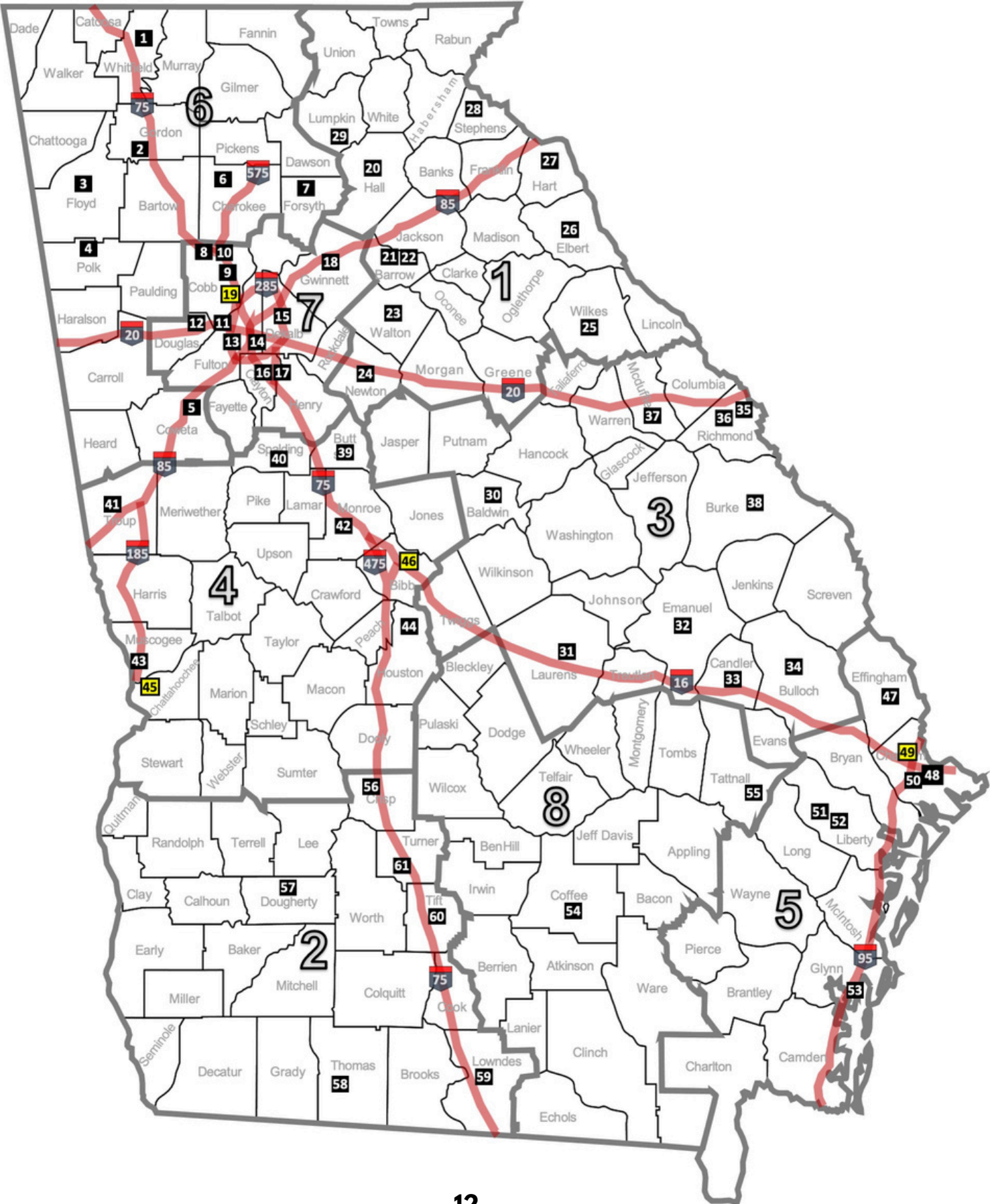
The State Partnership Program continues to be one of the Georgia National Guard's key strategic contributions to national security. Our partnerships with the country of Georgia and Argentina are in their 28th and seventh years, respectively. In 2023, we conducted 42 engagements with our Georgian partners, including eight senior leader engagements.

For the first time since before the COVID-19 pandemic, we were able to host groups of Georgians here in the United States. Multiple Army National Guard units hosted their "sister" units to share best practices during collective training exercises. The Joint Staff Domestic Operations team hosted a joint group from the Georgian National Guard and the Georgian Emergency Management Service. We hosted two members of the Georgian Parliament on a multi-day engagement that included meeting with state legislators and the Cobb Chamber of Commerce.

Governor Kemp and First Lady Kemp visited the country of Georgia and met with the Minister of Defence and the Prime Minister to show support for the continued success of the State Partnership Program and to create opportunities for whole-of-society partnerships.

Our Air National Guard team helped deliver and train Argentine Air Force crews on a leased C-130, which was critical to the Argentine mission to provide emergency evacuation for research stations in Antarctica. We followed up on that success by hosting senior members of the Argentine Air Force here in Georgia, setting the way for a greater level of engagement in the future. In 2023 we built on the success of many years of partnership and took steps to advance each partnership to a higher level.

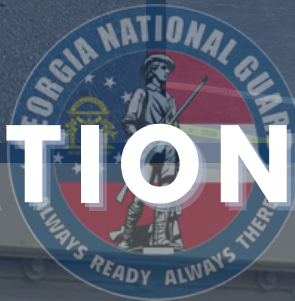
Disaster Response

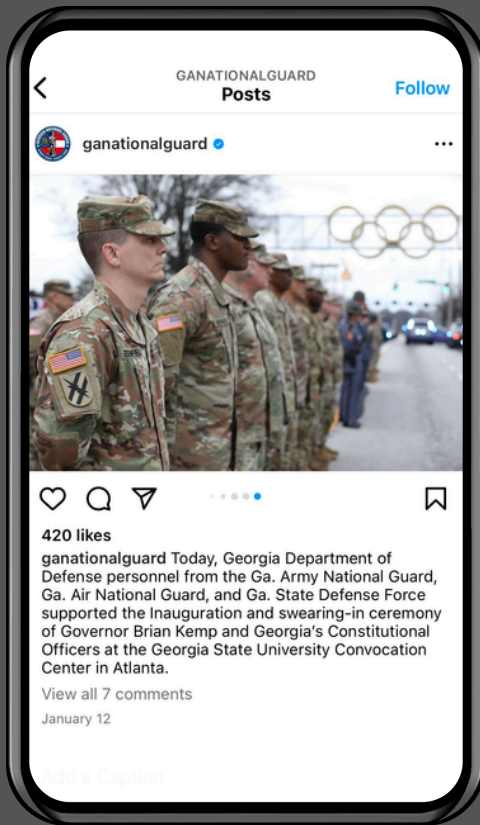
