# LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

The Georgia Department of Defense (Ga. DoD) is proud to present our 2025 annual report. This report highlights the incredible accomplishments of the almost 15,000 Soldiers, Airmen, and civilians of the Georgia Army National Guard (Ga. ARNG), Georgia Air National Guard (Ga. ANG), Georgia State Defense Force (Ga. SDF) and our federal and state employees. The Ga. DoD is more engaged than ever. ARNG's armories and readiness centers, most of which were originally built in the 1950's and 60's.

The Georgia Army and Air National Guard once again finished the year with record enlistments, while also exceeding their annual retention goals. This achievement not only enables us to effectively man our formations to meet all federal and state mission requirements, it also gives us a competitive advantage when being considered for future force structure, missions, and growth.

In closing, I want to personally thank each of our service-members, civilian employees and our families for their selfless service, professionalism, and commitment to what we do. I am honored and humbled to serve alongside such a great team. 



# Georgia DoD Wins

## Operational Readiness & Training Excellence

- The Ga. Army National Guard was selected as the "Best National Guard Command" by the Association of the United States Army (AUSA).
- The Ga. Air National Guard received the prestigious "Air and Space Organizational Excellence Awards (ASOEA)" for exceptionally meritorious service 2021 - 2023.
- Georgia ANG and ARNG Recruiting and Retention units exceeded goals and remain among the best in the nation.

## Modernization and Capability Enhancement

- Activated the first-of-its-kind Electromagnetic Warfare Company in the U.S. Army, enhancing signal intelligence and support to combatant commanders.
- Completed ribbon-cutting events for eight newly renovated readiness centers across the state.
- Georgia's ANG is pioneering national unmanned aviation integration—creating change in foundational training for future operators of fielded combat-proven drone programs that enhance warfighter situational awareness.

## National Guard Bureau & Interagency Collaboration

- Provided Guardsmen to Joint Task Force District of Columbia to combat crime.
- Contributed personnel to provide administrative support at five U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) sites.
- Hosted and led the National Guard Bureau's Patriot 2025 exercise including over 1,200 participants and 37 aircraft, enhancing inter-agency response capabilities.

## Leader Advancements and Awards

- Celebrating the nominations of two former adjutants general, with Lt. Gen. Thomas M. Carden Jr. nominated to serve as Vice Chief of the National Guard Bureau, a four star role, while Maj. Gen. Joseph F. Jarrard, has been nominated for appointment as lieutenant general and assigned as deputy commander of U.S. Northern Command.
- Maj. Gen. Bobby L. Christine assumed duties as The Judge Advocate General of the Army.

# GEORGIA **ARMY** NATIONAL GUARD



## WINS

- Exceeded recruitment (1,425 Soldiers, 144 percent of goal) and retention (120 percent of goal), demonstrating strong community support and culture.
- Army National Guard selected Ga. ARNG for the top Command Maintenance Discipline Program among the 54 states and territories.
- 1st Battalion, 118th Field Artillery Regiment received the AUSA and National Guard Association of the United States prestigious Walter T. Kerwin Jr. Readiness Award for readiness.

## CHALLENGES

- Maintaining readiness for national security, domestic support, and future conflicts is a priority, despite increasing fiscal limitations.
- Actively modernizing Ga. ARNG force structure, equipment, and weapons to maintain lethality, interoperability, and parity alongside the active component.
- Significant infrastructure challenges, with 113 facilities over 50 years old.

## WAY AHEAD

- As the Army transitions toward Large Scale Combat Operations (LSCO), the Ga. ARNG is postured to receive new force structure and equipment to include the Bell MV-75 Future Long Range Assault Aircraft and unmanned aerial systems.
- Continue to invest both state and federal resources into existing facilities while also looking for opportunities to build new ones.
- Modernize Land Dominance Center to accommodate two brigades (approximately 6,000 Soldiers) to support training capacity for the nation's southeastern region.

# GEORGIA AIR NATIONAL GUARD



## WINS

- Drove mission transition by securing an MQ-9 aircraft and establishing a “train-the-trainer” cadre, building enduring maintenance expertise and future operational independence.
- Executed 1,200 flight hours despite resource gaps and received four C-130Js, advancing planned aircraft authorization and demonstrating operational excellence under constraint.
- The Combat Readiness Training Center supported seamless live and virtual exercises with 69,000 training days, 52,935 bed nights, and 35,254 meals, sustaining force readiness.

## CHALLENGES

- The 116th Mission Support Group absorbed 98 percent of the wing’s Title 5 cuts while hiring freezes persisted, severely limiting staffing and support for new missions and core services.
- Training was disrupted by production issues, causing 1,370 non-mission capable hours; delays in four C-130J deliveries further constrained aircraft access and readiness.
- Growing certification and inspection demands are expanding training requirements; completing the Consolidated Operations building is essential to support larger, integrated exercises and future missions.

## WAY AHEAD

- Addressing staffing shortfalls while accelerating personnel development through cross-training and certification programs to ensure readiness for upcoming missions.
- Receiving the final four C-130Js in FY26 will achieve conversion readiness, with ongoing efforts to prioritize and expedite aircraft modifications for mission success.
- Collaborating with leadership to design training areas that balance certification events with other exercises, optimize infrastructure use, and enhance mission effectiveness for all training center users.

# GEORGIA STATE DEFENSE FORCE



## WINS

- GSDF-2030 Plan - Transformation from a staff heavy structure to a more agile 12-man cross functional team organization to better support Ga. DoD and the citizens of Georgia.
- Deployed to Hurricane Helene in 2024, first time assigned under tactical control of Ga. ARNG Task Forces.
- Stood up the first drone team in Ga. SDF history.

## CHALLENGES

- Equipping for transition while maximizing use of limited budget.
- Changing recruiting focus from mid career to second career or retiree recruits that are lower fitness levels, to first or early career younger recruits that are higher fitness level but may not be able to fund their own equipment.
- Leverage retired GSDF senior officers and noncommissioned officers to recruit and liaise with local county emergency management agencies.

## WAY AHEAD

- Continue establishing Incident Management Support Groups to expand Ga. DoD liaisons working with county emergency management agencies.
- Triple the number of existing drone team platforms.
- Continue expansion of operational teams from 14 to 26.

# GEORGIA DOD STATE OPERATIONS

## WINS

- Managed over \$128.9 million in combined state and federal funds, to include more than \$12.3 million in state general funds, \$17.7 million in other state funds and \$98.7 million in federal funds.
- In state FY25, spent \$15.5 million in support of the State Operational Asset Readiness (SOAR) construction program.
- Provided administrative support for State Active Duty missions, including assistance to North and South Carolina, totaling approximately 18,000 man-days and over \$4.6 million in expenditures.

## CHALLENGES

- Transition to new Statewide Enterprise Resource and Planning System.
- Recruitment and retention of human capital.
- Increased technical expertise requirements in accounting, budget, and procurement.

### Youth Challenge Academy (YCA)

- The Fort Gordon and Fort Stewart Youth Challenge academies provided opportunities for personal development and educational achievement within a 22-week residential military-like environment.
- Holistic development of cadets in eight core component areas of academic excellence, physical fitness, life-coping skills, leadership and followership, responsible citizenship, health and hygiene, job skills development, and service to the community.
- FY 2025: 337 cadet graduates, 70 GEDs, 83 high school diplomas, and 1,448 high school credits. 11,130 hours in community service.

### Job Challenge Academy (JCA)

- The Job Challenge Academy continues the focus on the Youth Challenge eight core components in addition to workplace enhancement skills training in OSHA safety, ServSafe certification, Lean Six-Sigma, Georgia driver's permit, forklift license, job search, resume writing, and interview skills.
- 78 Associates graduated in 2025 with vocational training in certified nursing or certified medical assistant, phlebotomy, basic welding, HVAC, culinary arts, barbering, and manufacturing logistics.
- Associates completed 1,797 hours in community service.

### STARBASE

- 5th Grade STEAM Curriculum: 25 hours of hands-on instruction at CNGC for 1,000 students per year.
- Community Outreach: Supplemental STEAM enrichment for over 500 students, teachers, and parents annually.
- STARBASE Program Impact: Since 2001, more than 17,000 students from local school systems, home schools, and private schools have participated.
- Program Recognition: Recognized as one of the first STARBASE Centers of Excellence.

# Facilities Management

The Georgia National Guard Construction and Facilities Management Office (CFMO) focuses efforts on state and federal facilities; maintenance, repair, and new construction. This office maintains a net worth \$1.85 billion in facilities, with \$1 billion federal and \$850 million state properties.



The Ga. ARNG has 278 primary mission facilities, of which, 113 are more than 50 years old:

- 50 Readiness Centers
- 63 facilities that directly support unit missions, including maintenance facilities and training support facilities



The State Operational Asset Readiness (SOAR) program has helped modernize Readiness Centers across the state. Each project is approximately \$4 million, with federal and state budgets sharing the cost.

Of the 49 planned SOAR projects, 23 are complete, with five projects anticipated to be completed by the end of 2026.

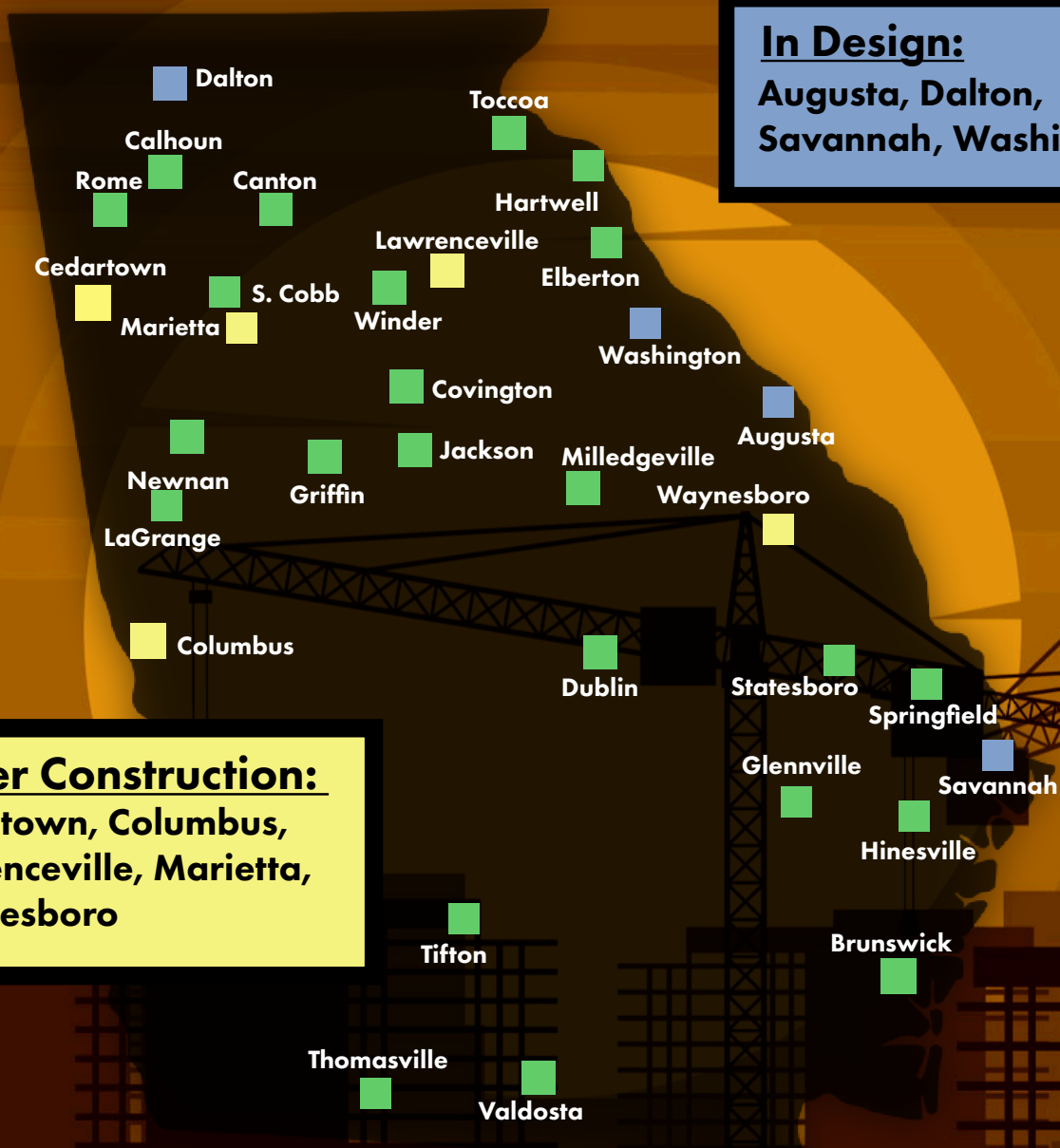

# Georgia DoD Joint Staff

The Georgia Department of Defense Joint Staff provides the strategic leadership, management, and direction necessary to ensure the Georgia Army National Guard, Air National Guard, and State Defense Force remain fully prepared for both state and federal missions. Its central mission is to maintain situational awareness and enable the rapid deployment of capable forces in support of civil authorities and homeland defense.



The Joint Staff directs a wide range of programs and specialized units, from youth engagement initiatives to the Counterdrug Task Force. Internationally, the State Partnership Program extends Georgia's reach by fostering enduring relationships with the countries of Georgia and Argentina. The partnership with Georgia focuses on enhancing its defense capabilities and multinational interoperability in support of stability and security in the Black Sea region, while the Argentina partnership advances shared priorities such as disaster response and cybersecurity. Internally, the Business Transformation Office drives organizational change by teaching and providing the framework necessary to ensure effective governance and accountability while aligning initiatives with long-term strategic goals.



These capabilities are continuously sharpened through joint training exercises. Patriot 25 brought together Civil Support Teams from Georgia, North Carolina, and Michigan to rehearse active shooter and chemical biological detection scenarios. Later, Vigilant Guard 26-1 partnered Ga. DoD directorates and the 201st Regional Support Group to practice large-scale disaster response, including planning, messaging, decontamination, and search and rescue. These exercises ensure inter-agency cooperation and readiness to respond to crises at a moment's notice. This exercise provided a framework to prepare for contingencies operations in support of FIFA World Cup 2026.

# Georgia Counter-Drug Task Force

Mission: Reduce the supply and demand for illegal drugs by fostering relationships and partnering with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies specifically through illegal narcotic surveillance operations, reconnaissance, information / trend analysis, criminal case support analysis, marijuana eradication missions, aerial observation, and drug demand reduction efforts.

## Fiscal Year 2025

All seizures totaled \$322 million equaling \$904,000 per day for a program with a total annual cost of less than \$4.5 million per year.

Through ground reconnaissance, criminal analysis, aviation support, and drug demand reduction outreach, the Ga. National Guard is supporting the fight against drug use in Georgia. In FY25, the team helped to seize:

- \$4.2 million in U.S. currency
- 606 illegal firearms (Including 4 machine guns)
- 26 vehicles
- A total of 4,147 kg. of various illegal narcotics



In FY25, the Ga. CDTF has supported the seizure of 82.6M lethal doses of fentanyl (Up from 7.62 million in FY24).

The leading cause of death in the United States for males between the age of 18 and 45 is synthetic drug overdose. Less than 2 mg. of fentanyl is fatal. The Georgia Counter Drug Task Force has focused on this threat and initiated Operation Lethal Dose. The mission prioritizes synthetic drug reduction.

This effort has helped interdict enough fentanyl to kill the entire population of the state of Georgia seven times over.

The Drug Demand Reduction Outreach detachment provides education to Georgia's youth about the dangers of drug use.

- 22 events supporting Georgia Drug Free Coalitions
- 57 events within Georgia schools
- 6 National Guard events while partnering with recruiting

These efforts touched the lives of 13,717 at-risk youths who were trained or informed of substance misuse.



# Family Programs

**Mission:** To enhance Georgia DoD readiness by providing vital education, support, and resources to service members, families, and veterans.



**Work for Warriors – Georgia (WFWGA):** Placed 252 individuals in jobs, generating \$3.1 million in tax revenue and \$2.6 million in unemployment savings.

**Participant Impact:** 79 percent reported improved finances, 90 percent reduced stress, and 75 percent cited WFWGA's influence on re-enlistment.

**Expanded Outreach:** WFWGA forged 232 new partnerships and attended 2,836 outreach events.

**Military and Family Readiness Program:** Managed 477 cases, delivering financial assistance, employment support, and behavioral health connections. The annual Christmas Assistance Program supported more than 230 children.

**Strategic Collaborations:** Partnered with University of North Georgia cadets, supported deployed Soldiers, and participated in key industry events.

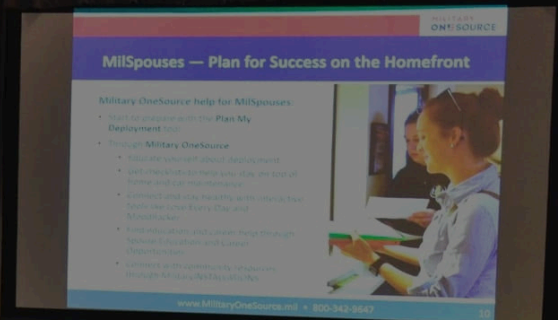


**Yellow Ribbon:** Conducted 10 mobilization events before and after deployment, serving 2,354 personnel and families.

**Looking Ahead:** The Military and Family Support Branch remains dedicated to strengthening the foundations of readiness through continued investment in the well-being of those who serve, their families, and veterans.

**Youth Programs:** Engaged 663 youth through 41 events, earning the prestigious Silver Keystone Club National Charter.

**Additional Programs:** Employer Support of Guard and Reserve, Resilience Team, Transition Assistance, Military OneSource.
